News in brief

Raizer Chairs for our First Responders

At the Pewsey Vale Health & Wellbeing Forum, it was confirmed that the two Raizer Chairs, delivered through donations from Parish Councils and grant funding, are now operational. In such a rural area, First Responders are frequently the first on the scene and will be on their own. Often they are called out to falls but are unable to lift the person because it needs at least two people to do this safely. As a result, this then necessitates an ambulance and a visit to A&E, even though the person may not actually require any treatment. A Raizer Chair is a kit that the First Responder can assemble and then, using clever technology, the chair raises the person from the floor into a seated or standing position. Although the chairs have only been deployed in the last couple of months, we already know of a lady in Pewsey who avoided a trip to hospital after a fall at home where one of these chairs was used.


Another Reader writes (from the heart and from the bath...)

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Our Farmer writes

As I sit here writing this the sun is shining and the birds are singing. I heard the cuckoo call this morning and the swifts have returned from their Winter away. Summer seems just around the corner

We go into the Summer with all of our crops looking well. Last Autumn was kind to the crops with mild weather and it was not too wet. This Spring has been a complete turn around from last year, with March last year very wet and the "Beast from the East", which meant that planting was delayed by nearly 6 weeks.

This year has seen much kinder weather and so our crops of spring barley and peas have been planted in good time and in perfect conditions, we have also been lucky to get just enough rainfall when the crops needed it. It is definitely unusual to find a farmer who is not complaining about the weather... it won't last I am sure!

Our cows have finished calving and are out grazing and moving their way around the farm. We keep them in one big group and split our fields up into small paddocks which will provide them with enough food for two days; so this involves moving them on every two days. The cows do not return to graze the same grass for around 60 days allowing plenty of recovery time for the grasses.

Our sheep have moved on to pastures new so that I can focus more time and effort into the cows which we will keep for the next couple of years.

A new addition on the farm are some bee hives which a local beekeeper has introduced to help to pollinate our flowering crops and to produce some honey.

We have many areas across the farm which are managed to encourage wildlife. One of these is an area of bare ground which is preserved to encourage waders, such as lapwing and stone curlew, this is being monitored by the RSPB and they have seen evidence of successful nesting by both target species.

Farmers enjoy seeing people out walking, running and riding on their farms. Please help us by keeping to marked footpaths and by keeping dogs under close control or better still on a lead. Young animals, both livestock (especially lambs) and wildlife (particularly ground nesting birds like the lapwing and stone curlew), are very vulnerable to overzealous dogs.



Parish Council Chairman's Summary of the year:

Speed watch:

We needed volunteers and I am pleased to say new ones came forward and received the training. More volunteers have since applied and we are waiting for the police to arrange the training. Over the year we caught nearly 100 speeders with an average speed of 45 mph. We continue to take speeding in the Parish very seriously and are in pursuit of Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs)

Coronation Hall:

The hall continues to be a tremendous success and to cover its own costs with regular and occasional hire. We are all very grateful for all the hard work put in by volunteers who run the hall so successfully and look forward to their report.

Youth Activities:

What hasn't Annie done? Starting with a cracking Parish rounders event which saw everyone come together for fun and merriment on the green and incidentally made £555 profit which was split between the church and the zip wire fund. The Youth Activities report will follow.

Picture Palace:

We have our own cinema nights in the hall. This year films included "Darkest Hour" attended by 30 people and "The Greatest Showman". The sound system does not provide the best quality for the audience and therefore research is being undertaken into improving it.

Playing Fields:

The skate ramp and jungle equipment passed a clean bill of health last summer but various activities, including skating on a pallet, saw the ramp turn into a state of disrepair. The ramp was closed temporarily whilst the necessary repairs were carried out and it continues to be enjoyed by many local children. The outfield was used for junior cricket attended by 30 - 40 local children coached by capable fathers and local cricketers. Meanwhile plans for the zip wire go ahead. We are trying to raise funds of around £6000 to make sure we have a fully traceable, safe and well-built structure.

Defibrillators:

We successfully moved the Marten Defibrillator from the Manor to the wall at the bottom of Mr Pash's drive thereby making it more accessible to the village. New batteries were put in this year where required.

Remembrance Day:

The PC and the PCC held a very good joint event supported by Chris Beale, Charles Baxter and Dougie Wilcox among many others. We held a service that began outside the Church at the Parish war memorial, included the unveiling of the memorial for the men of Wilton who went off to war, a choir recital, readings from letters written during the war and the service was followed by a celebration of the peace at the hall. Meanwhile the green was converted into a battle field complete with vehicles and trenches and the Coronation Hall displayed a terrific mural created by the Youth Group.

Coronation Hall Report

I am pleased to report that the hall is in good shape financially. In 2018 it generated a surplus of £4490. Most of our costs are relatively static, although we have seen inflationary increases across the board. However we have not had any major repairs or renewals to undertake in the past year.

The caretaker vacancy for a large part of last year meant that our costs were some £3500 lower than in the previous year. There are sufficient reserves for future maintenance not least a redecoration in the next eighteen months to two years for which we are budgeting £6000. We are also mindful that we have not yet had to replace any kitchen equipment, or carry out any major repairs to the heating and air conditioning systems.

Our income is made up of regular hirers £11,204 (up by £3000 on the previous year due exclusively to Miss Charlotte's increased dance classes), and one off hirers £3459 (down by £2000 on the previous year) nearly half of which is from children's parties. Last year we did not receive any income from elections, but this year we will receive £500 for the European elections. However Miss Charlotte has slightly reduced her usage, so that next year the regular hirer income will be down by £800.

We do now have a healthy management committee, a great new cleaner in Suzanne, and a wonderful new caretaker, Maria. I am sure that everybody would agree that the hall is looking very neat and tidy. We have in the last year introduced the Community Markets which have been a great success. There have been two so far and there are two more booked in for the coming year. The outside parking area seems to have withstood the winter well, but we are planning to have the pot holes in the drive filled again this summer.

There have been lengthy discussions about the Hall audio/ visual system, particularly in light of the Moviola nights. We have been presented with some good options by Crispin Herod Taylor, but there is some debate as to how far we go with this, and given that the investment will be from reserves, what level of investment we can justify. We do intend to meet with the interested parties to discuss this further.

Sunflowers at Grafton is not-for-profit and community run, and is in great health. We continue to build on our reputation for outstanding child care with particular attention to use of outdoor space and activities to encourage and inspire play and learning. Highlights from the past year included many trips for our pre school children using our minibuses, including a trip to Roche Court Sculpture Park (Salisbury) and a new collaboration with the Gamekeepers Trust for 2 days of Country Pursuits during our summer holiday club for primary school children. We have seen few changes in our wonderful childcare team which is quite an achievement in the current early years sector. We have also managed the introduction of 30 hours funded childcare which has caused some well publicised financial challenges across the sector.

The upkeep of our building and grounds requires significant investment of time and money to stay fit for purpose. Last summer we received donations to install an efficient boiler and water cylinder which will make significant energy savings.

Maintaining strong links with, and making a positive contribution to, the Parish will always be a priority for us. We provide local employment opportunities (are we the largest local employer we wonder?) and over 50% of our employees live in Grafton Parish, Bedwyn and Burbage. Our board of trustees is made up of parents and members of the community and we always welcome conversations with parish residents who would like to contribute.

Community access to our gardens and playground; making our minibus available to community groups, including Grafton Youth Activities and a local cricket team; hosting the World's Biggest Coffee Morning for Macmillan Cancer Support and raising money for Wiltshire Air Ambulance are all part of our commitment to Grafton Parish. In addition, members of our team continue to give their time to support other community activities and events. This year Sunflowers' team members have supported our local baby and toddler group, organised the Great British Spring Clean litter pick and supported the production and delivery of our community newsletter.

Wilton Windmill Society

The last year was very successful for the Society and the Mill continues to be in good condition with only modest maintenance issues to be addressed this season. We completed a full season of guiding, opening on every Sunday and Bank Holiday throughout the summer. Special events included our regular Smoke and Mirrors murder mystery evening that attracted 130 paying guests and the Wind in the Willows themed Family Fun Day that attracted over 1000 visitors and made a net £6000 contribution to the Society's funds.

Of significant note was the decision to relocate and renovate a 19th century granary from Lackham College. The granary was falling in to disrepair- however it was the inspiration of James Arnold-Baker that kept it for prosperity by relocating it to the site of the Windmill. This project is now complete and the granary is open to the public as an educational facility. The Society would also like to give specific thanks to Peter Lemon who provided interim funding while the project was being implemented.

The Society takes its responsibilities for the health and safety of its volunteers and members very seriously and we are pleased to announce that there have no adverse health and safety issues throughout the season. Indeed we have further strengthened our health and safety working practices with the addition of safely lines, lanyards and harnesses for sail climbing and will be implementing a first aid course for volunteers later in the season.

Financially the Society is in a robust position with adequate funds to meet foreseeable expenditure. This has been aided by a generous donation from the family of Peter Pender-Cudlip, a founder member of the Society, and a strong start to the season which saw us take over £1000 in revenue over the Easter bank holiday.

In summary the Society is in a strong position going into the 2019 season and continues to fulfil its obligations in maintaining the mill as an important parish heritage asset that continues to provide education and entertainment to parishioners and visitors alike.

Lyme disease, also described as 'the new great imitator', is the most common vector-borne disease in the northern hemisphere. Whilst early diagnosis and treatment may provide a cure, symptoms can be non-specific and easily missed, with potentially serious consequences. The Royal College of GPs has launched a new toolkit, 'Spotlight on Lyme Disease,' which aims to raise the profile of Lyme disease amongst primary care clinicians and the general public. There is an e-learning module available for all health care professionals focusing on the clinical features of this easily missed condition, links to evidence based guidelines for treatment and the need for further research. Information for the general public focuses on disease prevention and early recognition of symptoms and includes advice on tick bite avoidance and correct tick removal.

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Some key facts

Lyme disease is a bacterial infection caused by Borrelia burgdorferi and is transmitted by the bite of a tick. Ticks are carried on wild animals and birds and are present throughout the UK, although most prevalent in Scotland and southern England. Peak time for tick bites is late spring/early summer, ie NOW. The bite is usually painless and ticks are small and may go unnoticed. The incidence of Lyme disease is increasing. However, most ticks in the UK are not infected by Borrelia burgdorferi. Prompt tick removal decreases the risk of infection. There is no proven minimum time of attachment needed for transmission of infection and it is possible that it takes 24-48 hours for the bacteria in an infected tick to pass into a human, the time it takes for a tick to become engorged. So, if you remove a tick promptly and it is not engorged, you are much less likely to develop Lyme disease, even if it is an infected tick.

Early symptoms may be flu-like and non-specific (feeling hot, shivery, headaches, aching muscles, nausea). A circular red rash, erythema migrans, is diagnostic. This spreads outwards 5cm or more from the bite anytime from 3 days to 3 months. It may sometimes occur away from the site of the bite. In 30% of cases the rash may be absent and diagnosis can be difficult in these cases. In early disease Lyme serology blood tests may be unreliable because the antibody response takes several weeks to reach detectable levels. A negative test does not exclude the diagnosis. A blood test is recommended if there is diagnostic uncertainty or more severe symptoms and, if negative initially, a repeat test is advised in 3 to 4 weeks to determine whether antibodies have developed.

If you develop symptoms following a tick bite a course of antibiotics will treat the infection very effectively (95% cure rate). Early diagnosis and adequate treatment provide the best chance of a cure. There is no international consensus on the duration of treatment. If you are bitten by a tick and do not develop symptoms you do not need to take antibiotics 'just in case'. In most cases, the infection does not progress any further, even without treatment, as the immune system clears the infection. Unfortunately in some people untreated or inadequately treated Lyme disease may progress after the initial infection to cause joint, nerve and heart problems. Again there is no international consensus of opinion on the cause and management of persistent symptoms and further research is required in this area. Current scientific research is seeking to explore issues such as: whether the bacteria may survive antibiotic treatment and cause persistent infection, how the bacteria interact with the human immune system to survive immune clearance and whether post-infectious immune dysfunction results in persistent symptoms following treatment. Research is also focusing on a safe and effective vaccine for Lyme disease.

To prevent a tick bite it is sensible to wear long sleeved clothes in forested, heath-land, long grass or scrub areas and use insect repellent containing DEET. Check for ticks daily and if you find one remove by holding the tick as close to the skin as possible so that you have its mouth parts. If you are outdoors you can use your fingers covered by tissue paper, but if possible use tweezers. Pull gently without twisting as this reduces the risk of mouth parts detaching from the body. Clean the area with water or a skin disinfectant as soon as you can
