#### **Grafton Parish Council Chairman's report – 2019-20 a year of ups and downs**

#### **Traffic and Speeding**

Huge thanks to Natalie Neal who stood down last year as a Parish Councillor and, amongst other things, the unenviable task of running the speed watch group. Mr Andrew Paine has taken over the mantle and of trying to cajole volunteers, to get Wiltshire to put on training events for volunteers and then get hold of the equipment to run the Speed Watch sessions.

Speed and/or traffic has been the theme for this 2019/20 year with Mike Hyslop making great strides with CATG (Community Area Transport Group) and achieving several traffic calming measures. The new painted lines, the re-enforcement of the speed limits on the roads, the cats eyes in the two narrow places in the centre of East Grafton and perhaps the jewel in the crown, the acquisition of the SID (Speed Indicator Device).

I am delighted to report that we have now achieved some of the traffic and speeding related goals we set out to achieve several years ago with more to come. Crispin Herrod-Taylor got the SID up and running last month and we look forward to utilising the data stored inside it as well as reducing speed through the village.

#### **Village Fete**

Kevin and Annette Burke put on a splendid village fete that was slightly thwarted by an unkind day's weather but those who came thoroughly enjoyed themselves. There was an abundance of fete style games, a BBQ and bar, cakes, art shows, dog shows, tug of war and even a chariot race (of sorts). The event raised enough to donate £350 to Wiltshire Air Ambulance, £250 for St Nicholas' Church and £200 towards the Youth Activities.

#### **Youth Activities**

The Youth Activities Group have been on some serious adventures this year, trips to Oasis in Swindon, Thruxton race track for go carting, Oxenwood in the dark for midnight orienteering, cake baking, pizza making, tie dying and crazy golfing. We are very lucky to have Annie Whitcher heading up this enterprise but as ever she needs more support and we hope more volunteers will come forward to help her.

#### Security

Sadly the Parish bubble was pricked last year when a number of homes were broken into. As Plato is credited with saying "Necessity is the mother of invention" and so out of the sadness and distress of being burgled Chris Beale led the village to its Neighbourhood Watch fightback. We had a very informative evening with the police, supported by members of the Parish, including Mr Wilcocks who offered a free check of windows and doors for parish residents. The police recommended WhatsApp groups (on mobile phones) to act as an early warning system when undesirables are lurking and these have been set up in the Parish.

#### Covid-19

The WhatsApp groups have, since the outbreak of Covid-19 which has isolated thousands of people in this country, taken on a whole new life. Speaking from my experience in Wilton the WhatsApp group has been a lifeline for the more vulnerable or senior members of our village. That ping reminds you that 50 friendly faces are within metres of your home should you need anything. It's been a great way for Bill Clemence to remind us when it is take-away Pizza night at the Swan or that a resident has got a massive shipment of compost coming in and would anyone like some for their gardens. What started as a way of warning us about bad things going on has turned (however irritating it might be on occasions) into a way of bringing everyone closer together - even though we've never really felt far apart.

#### **Road Repairs**

We still have reservations about our Parish Steward who believes socially isolating involves moving from one remote lay-by to the next! I am joking, because we have started to see improvements in his activities. Given the horrendous weather we have had since September, his main duties have been to repair potholes. I am pleased to report that we have found a reasonably straight forward approach to getting things done. Villagers tell a member of the PC what they want done, this is passed on to me and I physically meet with the Steward and pass it on to him. That way perhaps as much as 50% gets done which, whilst still poor, is a 50% improvement!

#### Thanks to Every Member of the PC

Mike Hatherell has been looking into the village plan and exploring the options of making a neighbourhood plan for the future. This is work in progress and may take a lot of time. Ann Dudney has been running the accounts, sorting out planning applications as well as working with the Community News Team to publicise local events and information. George Hosier has been overseeing the playing field and recently Ann Dudney has helped us to engage a gardener who will, we hope, will bring it back into good heart. Annie Whitcher, as Parish Council representative, is heavily involved in the running of the Coronation Hall in addition to her duties as Vice Chairman of the PC. George Hosier oversees the defibrillators in the Parish and ensures that they are maintained in good order for emergencies when they are needed.

I would like to state on the record that the Parish has a fantastic team as their Parish Council, diligent and hardworking, doing a great deal behind the scenes. When the Coronavirus outbreak happened, immediately a representative of the PC from each village jumped into action by organising groups of helpers for shopping or medicine collection and to be an ear for those in isolation. They really stepped forward for our community. I wish to pass on my thanks on behalf of the Parish Council for everything they have done this year.

We are financially in a good state, however we would still be grateful for any contribution the Parish Council can offer. Of course the advent of Covid-19 has brought our activities to a halt even though our services are probably needed more than ever.

Unfortunately as you are probably aware, most of our volunteers are over the age of 70 and have had to go into isolation for their well-being but we will be ready to return to our normal routine as soon as this is permitted.

#### **Wilton Windmill Society**

The Windmill Society had a successful 2019, being open to the public on every Sunday throughout the summer with record numbers of visitors. We were able to further support the community through the hosting of a successful murder mystery event for 140 people and opening for the National Heritage Open Day when the restored 19<sup>th</sup> century granary was formally opened to the public. I am also pleased to report that there were no health and safety related incidents reported during the vear.

.We entered 2020 in a strong financial position with £14,000 cash at hand, and the windmill in excellent condition ready for a new season of milling. The Covid19 pandemic has however caused the Society to cancel its planned opening and events in 2020 and it is assumed that the windmill will not re-open this year. However, 2021 is the double centenary of the windmill and a full season of events and investments are planned to commemorate this milestone.

The on-going success of the Windmill Society is due solely to the commitment of its volunteers and I am pleased to report that we have a full and active committee, together with sufficient volunteers ready to resume operations when we re-open in 2021.

#### **Pewsey Vale Tourism Partnership**

Another busy year with a steady increase in membership. Sadly our members have been badly hit by the coronavirus pandemic, with many of them temporarily closed. We are working closely with our members to support them as much as we can and to ensure that they are aware of schemes, grants and other benefits they may be able to access during

closure. Our focus is on being prepared as lockdown is lifted to ensure that the Vale of Pewsey is a destination of choice as many people look to have a break in the UK.

The North Wessex Downs Walking Festival in June has been cancelled. We were hosting 4 walks across the Vale of Pewsey so these will now take place in the 2021 festival. In November 2019, we represented the Pewsey Vale Tourism Partnership, North Wessex Downs AONB and Wilton Windmill at an Army Family Day at Tidworth where there was lots of interest in walking and cycling and introduced many people to the Vale for the first time.

We continue to be active on the Council of Partners at the NWD AONB representing the PVTP and PCAP and hosted one of the expert workshops at the November Annual Forum (on the subject of tourism).

The last 7 weeks have been much quieter and we have adjusted to this new way of being. As we write it is still unclear when we will be able to reopen and what sort of long term implications this crisis might have. But we are now planning how we reopen and look forward to seeing the little ones we have missed.

On the whole 2019/20 has been good year for Sunflowers at Grafton. Our nursery rooms are full and we have a steady stream of enquiries and new bookings. This year has seen a significant increase in uptake for our TreeHouse Breakfast & After School Clubs for children from Great Bedwyn, Burbage and St Katharine's Primary Schools. Our Holiday Club timetables continue to attract great interest too

Strong and healthy teams underpin our success. We have teams within Sunflowers including our fabulous nursery and TreeHouse teams, minibus drivers and support team. We have a wonderful board of trustees who balance support for current plans and progressing strategic plans. And we have teams outside Sunflowers including an extensive network with whom we collaborate to deliver amazing childcare.

We aim to be an integral part of the Grafton Parish team too. Community access to our gardens and playground; making our minibus available to community groups; hosting local fundraising events; and supporting other community activities and events are all part of our commitment to Grafton Parish.

Maintaining strong links with, and making a positive contribution to, the Parish will always be a priority for us. We provide local employment opportunities and over 50% of our team live in Grafton Parish, Bedwyn and Burbage. Our board of trustees is made up of parents and members of the community and we always welcome conversations with parish residents who would like to contribute to the team.




#### **Grafton Goslings baby & toddler group**

#### **Coronation Hall Report 2020**

This report is written at a time when, for the first time since it was built, The Coronation Hall lies empty, unused and dormant. There will be no further activities or income until such time as the lockdown is ended. Kindly our regular hirers have all elected not to take any refunds, so they will all restart their classes with credit balances. It is thankful that the Hall has good reserves and will not come under any financial pressure during this period.

Over the course of the year there is one new regular hirer, Tim Brew's yoga classes, and prior to the lockdown Miss Charlotte had planned to increase her bookings for dance classes. The regular hirers still account for over 70% of the Hall's income.

This year there is a surplus of £909, down on last year, largely because there was a lot of "catching-up" after a quiet year in terms of maintenance. Just prior to lockdown the planned redecoration of the hall commenced. It is being partially undertaken for free by Community Payback (offenders ordered to carry out community service). This is a well organised and supervised scheme that came to our attention after the work that they carried out for Burbage Primary School. The hall has to provide/purchase materials and equipment, and there will be some work that they are unable to do, but it does mean that the amount that was originally earmarked for the redecoration will be significantly reduced.

During the past year the hall's costs were relatively static compared to the previous year, although there are inflationary increases across the board. The hall committee has agreed with The Parish Council that the hall will start paying for its share of the parish insurance policy. Given that money has been saved on the redecorating costs the hall has also agreed to contribute to enable the Speed Indicators to be erected.

On behalf of the committee Ann Dudney has been exploring the possibilities with regards the repair/renovation of the track and car park area. A permanent solution is not going to be cheap, and it is hard to see how it can be achieved without fundraising or grant funding.

The Community Brunch and Markets have continued with great success. Three were held in the last year and it is planned to continue with them as soon as possible.

Just prior to the lockdown it was agreed that a Clothes Bank would be installed at The Hall which would collect on behalf of The Wiltshire Air ambulance.

As a committee we would like to thank Maria for continuing as the Hall caretaker; she has carried out many of the outstanding maintenance jobs from the previous year and has also now undertaken the role of cleaner. #### **Pewsey Community Area Partnership**

Youth Activities – working with the groups in Grafton with Annie Whitcher and in Bedwyn. The Family Fun day which was planned for 17th April was cancelled due to coronavirus but will be reorganised once gatherings are allowed.

PCAP continues to run the Health & Wellbeing Group and administering the grant process with Wiltshire Council. All the grant funds were allocated in the 2019 – 2020 year. Using a grant from the Health & Wellbeing Fund, PCAP ran a project to deliver 2 chairs with arms to every village hall in the Pewsey Community Area (17 took the offer, 2 abstained).

Through the Health & Wellbeing Fund we have also set up a fortnightly Movement to Music Together exercise class (thanks to Sylvie Clayden and Henrietta Mackinnon), with referrals through social prescription from doctors' surgeries, as well as others who have wanted to join. This has now been run online but we are currently applying for grants to get this set up in a sustainable way online as this vulnerable group are likely going to be on lockdown for some time to come. We continue to organise and run the Memory Café in Pewsey on the 3rd Monday of the month and had a fantastic trip in June on the canal with The Bruce Trust. We had planned to do another two trips this year, but these have been put on hold until after the lockdown. The café is cancelled for the foreseeable future until this vulnerable group are able to come out of lockdown.

Dawn Wilson and Colin Gale chair and run the Pewsey Vale Rail User Group (PVRUG) – working closely with Bedwyn Rail User Group, Great Western Railway, TransWilts and the Great West Way. The new timetable providing much better connection options to London and the west, was launched in December.

In response to central Government's initiative - Better Deal For Bus Users - to provide grants for new and improved rural bus services via local councils, PCAP and PVRUG submitted a case for a new bus/rail link service. The bus link would provide a service between Marlborough, Burbage, Upavon and Devizes linking commuters with Great Bedwyn and Pewsey Stations. There is clear evidence that commuter numbers are increasing, demonstrated by the growing car parking issues at both stations as well as from the rail user data.

From the experience of Wiltshire Council's process regarding the closure of Everleigh Household Recycling Centre, as well as their handling of a number of other public consultations, PCAP, CPRE and Pewsey Parish Council joined forces to follow up on the significant concerns these consultations raised. The main issue was the manner in which public input was considered by Wiltshire Council and how decisions were being taken. The Group raised these concerns with Wiltshire Council where the Overview & Scrutiny were tasked to investigate the concerns and report back to Cabinet. A Task Group was set up and has confirmed shortfalls in Wiltshire Council's handling of public consultations. The Group are continuing to progress this issue. PCAP has been able to support small community groups who want to run events by providing insurance for them through our own insurance policy – we have helped Bedwyn Footpaths Group and Shalbourne Connect. If there are any small community groups who need access to banking and insurance (which you need if you apply for grants), then we may be able to help them.

Working with the Pewsey Vale Tourism Partnership and Pewsey Parish Council, the Pewsey Business Matters project is now completed, including regular (6 monthly) footfall counts (which will continue), business surveys and public surveys. The report has been completed and provided to Pewsey Parish Council and was being progressed before coronavirus started.

PCAP had commenced work on the adoption of the Good Verge Guide across the Pewsey Community Area, but this has been put on hold for the time-being.

Our thanks go to all the Parish Councils who have kindly donated towards the running costs of PCAP which enables this work to continue.

You will need to take proof of your address including your postcode to prove that you are visiting on the correct date - this must be displayed in your vehicle window.

You will not get any assistance from staff at the recycling centres. Only 1 person per car and no soil, rubble, plasterboard, textiles or asbestos during this initial reopening phase.

Opening times 10am to 4pm.



#### **Our Doctor writes**

Although our main doors may be closed, general practices are working hard adapting to challenges on a daily basis to deliver a service using new technologies. This month I would like to update you about what is happening in general practice. We are still there for you!

#### COVID-19

People who think they have symptoms of COVID-19, most commonly a high fever over 38°c and a new persistent cough, should continue to phone NHS111 for advice and guidance. Please do not go to your GP surgery.

#### **Non-COVID-19 Appointments**

Since mid March GP practices have been using telephone and video consultations to assess patients. This will continue in order to minimise the risk of exposure to the virus for both patients and staff. Face to face consultations will be arranged if necessary to examine you and/or for blood tests. If you are asked to go to your surgery the clinician seeing you will be wearing personal protective equipment (PPE) and keep the time spent with you to a minimum. Social distancing will be observed in the waiting room and with all other staff. You can arrange a telephone/video appointment by contacting your surgery by phone or using doctorlink. This is a virtual 24/7 health assistant that connects you to your local NHS service, allowing you to check your symptoms confidentially and book an appointment with your own GP. **www.doctorlink.com**. At The Old School Surgery you can book a 10 minute telephone/video consultation and this should be regarded in the same way as if it is a face to face appointment. If your appointment is about a rash or a skin condition the receptionist will ask you to send a photograph.

#### Referrals and investigations

All routine referrals and non urgent diagnostic tests were suspended in mid March. Urgent cancer referrals and emergency referrals have continued. However there has been a significant drop in the number of cancer referrals nationally. If you have symptoms which you are concerned may be due to cancer, please make a telephone appointment. The referral pathways to hospitals and community services are being restored. Staff were redeployed to other services to cope with Covid 19 patients. It is hoped that GPs locally will be able to start referring this week and have access to test such as X Ray and ultrasound very soon. The consultants at The Great Western Hospital in Swindon, The Royal United in Bath and Salisbury District Hospital have always been very supportive to GPs and available for advice. They have been even more amazing during the current crisis and provided additional access via telephone and email for both Covid and non-Covid patients. These lines of communication will remain open to help GPs manage patients we would normally refer. If you are referred to hospital your appointment will most likely be a telephone appointment initially.

#### Childhood Immunisations, Screening and monitoring blood tests

The childhood immunisation programme has not changed and continues despite the pandemic. If you are sent an invitation for your child to be immunised please contact your surgery. Screening requiring face to face interaction has been suspended. At present cervical screening is only available for women who have had an abnormal smear previously. At The Old School Surgery the practice nurses manage the immunisation and screening programmes so if you have any questions please ask for a telephone appointment with the nurse. If you are taking medicines (eg warfarin, methotrexate, lithium, azathioprine, amiodarone) which require monitoring with a regular blood test please make an appointment with your practice nurse.

#### Repeat prescriptions

There are shortages of certain medicines at present especially inhalers. The dispensary team at The Old School Surgery are working very hard to ensure alternatives are found. However this takes time and it is taking longer that the previous 3 days to process repeat prescriptions. Please would you order your repeat prescription a week in advance to enable the dispensary team time to resolve any problems.

#### Joint injections and minor surgery

At The Old School Surgery the doctors are only performing urgent minor surgery, for example, draining an abscess. Patients have enquired about having joints injected to help manage pain. The advice from NHS England is not to do any joint injections. Steroids used to inject joints can reduce immunity and if you contract Covid 19 after your joint injection there is the potential for you to have a more severe, life threatening infection.

Thank you once again for all you kind words of support. We are managing to eat all the delicious cakes, biscuits, chocolates, fruit and the flowers brighten up our work areas.
