Our Farmer writes ...

Farting cows!?

There has been a bit of a lull on the farm recently as we have been waiting for some rain so as to continue with planting next year's crop. So here's something a little different from me for this month!

Over the last few of years ruminant animals have received rather a lot of bad press, this has mainly revolved around "cow farts" but more accurately it's enteric methane, exhaled from fermentation in the rumen (so burps, not farts!). Methane (CH4) is a greenhouse gas which has a much greater effect than carbon dioxide. What is really important to remember when cattle exhale the carbon dioxide (CO2) and CH4 the carbon is completely cyclical. Growing plants take CO2 out of the atmosphere as part of photosynthesis to produce sugars, lignin and starches. Cows consume these products and turn most of them into protein (for human consumption) and respire the rest as CO2.

The Carbon cycle, partially described above is often not fully understood as up to 40% of the carbon that plants capture through photosynthesis is actually passed through the roots into the soil, as root exudates, in a symbiotic relationship with microbes in the soil. These root exudates can remain in the soil for hundreds or thousands of years as humus. Humus is the building block of soil but although there is a limit to the amount of carbon a soil can hold, there is no limit to the amount of soil that root exudates and humus can create (just look at the depths of the soils found under the American Prairies, up to 6 feet deep).

The fossil records show that grasses and ruminant animals co-evolved around 55 million years ago. The act of grazing a grass plant triggers an increase in photosynthesis as the plant recovers. In many dry parts of the world, properly managed grazing animals are essential for maintaining effective grass growth.

Managing pastures to replicate how grasslands around the world (such as the Prairies) were formed can go a long way to sequester carbon from our atmosphere. These ancient grasslands were formed in conjunction with huge herds of ruminant animals, bison, buffalo, elk, elephants, kudu, etc. roaming the ancient grasslands of Africa, America, Europe and Asia, bunched tightly together to protect themselves from Predators and moving on regularly to avoid eating grasses tainted by the herd's excrement. It was this symbiotic relationship between the moving herds and the grasses which produced such deep rich soils, full of carbon in the form of humus. That is on a very small scale what we are trying to replicate on the Downs at Wexcombe. We try to act as the Predator with the aid of electric fences to bunch the animals onto a small area of land and we move them regularly. This allows the grasses to be grazed as they evolved to be grazed, with a single bite followed by a long Rest Period. The crucial part of this grazing system for the carbon sequestration is this Rest Period, as it allows the plants to fully recover before being grazed again.

We are certainly still learning with this System, which requires much planning and monitoring of the grass to decide when to graze and how much to give the herd at anytime. However, the results so far seem to be good for the animals, grass, wildlife and the soil.

Our Doctor writes



It is time for flu jabs. The 65 and over flu jabs are now available at your surgery or local pharmacy. There has been a delay in the vaccines for children aged 2 to 17 and for adults 18 to 64, but they should be available soon.

You are eligible for the flu vaccination if you are:

- aged 65 or over on 31st March 2020
- aged 18 to 64 and either pregnant, or at increased risk from flu because of a long-term health condition eg. diabetes, heart and respiratory problems
- a child aged 2 and 3 on 31st August 2019
- a child in primary school
- a child aged from 6 months to 17 years at increased risk of flu due to a long term health condition
- a frontline health or social care worker

Flu can make you feel unwell with symptoms, which often start suddenly, such as fever, headache, sore throat, lethargy, loss of appetite, aching muscles and a cough. However, if you are usually healthy, it should resolve over one to two weeks on its own without the need to see a doctor. It can be more severe and more likely to result in potentially serious complications in the groups listed above, except for health care workers - we simply cannot be unwell so we can continue to do our jobs!

This year's flu vaccines are effective against four types of flu. All vaccines contain two influenza A strains, swine (H1N1) and variant H3N2 swine flu, which was nick-named Aussie flu last year. Type A is the more serious type and can cause flu pandemics. Type A is also more likely to mutate into a new version that people are not resistant to, hence the need for an annual injection. Two influenza B strains are in vaccines for high risk groups and children, but only one B strain is in the vaccine for 65 and over. Type B flu viruses generally cause a less severe illness and are responsible for smaller outbreaks. They mainly affect young children. Type C viruses cause a mild illness similar to the common cold. No cure for that yet!

So, vaccinations will not stop all flu viruses, just these four viruses which The World Health Organisation have predicted will be most prevalent this year. The level of protection may vary, so it is not a 100% guarantee that you'll be flu-free, but if you do get flu after having the vaccination, it is likely to be milder and shorter-lived than it would otherwise have been.

The flu vaccines have a good safety record and the best time to have your vaccination is from now until the end of November. For those registered at The Old School Surgery flu clinics are available from now so book your place. Our big Saturday morning clinic is on 19th October (for vaccinations only). People in high risk groups are being contacted and invited to come in.

I highly recommend you have your flu vaccination. I have mine every year.
