

To celebrate the Coronation of King George vi in 1938 the original Coronation Hall was opened.

It is difficult to read the press cutting but this was sent to the Community News team by a reader whose father lived in Saddlers Cottage at the time. The sender now lives outside the UK but emailed this cutting when he read about the new Coronation Hall on our website in 2009!

OPENED BY MARQUES AILESBURY.

Described as an effort signalising the work of everyone in the neighbourhood, Grafton Coronation Hall was formally opened by the Marquess of Ailesbury on Saturday.

Speaking of the hall as a worthy object, the Marquis said: "I think it is more than ever necessary nowadays that every community of people should have a central place where they can go for their entertainment—a place which will form a real centre of village life."

Built in keeping with its rustic surroundings, the hall, standing on the side of the village green, is made chiefly of Canadian cedar wood and will accommodate about 200 people. It has cost £450. Of this amount, £150 was contributed by the National Council of Social Service, another £150 was borrowed interest free over five years, while the remainder has been contributed, by local people.

Introducing the Marquess, Mr. Richard Marshall, chairman of the Hall Committee, said it was a proud day for Grafton.

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The Marquess said everybody would appyeciate the assistance of the National Council of Social Service, and Mr. John Hussey, of Bournemouth when presented the site to the village.

Note of thanks was proposed to Marquess by the Rev. W. R. W. W. Mr. A. E. Cubison, proposing a vote manks to the committee appealed villagers to remember the committee had done its part. It remained for the inhabitants to do their share by ig the hall. "Make it a centre for scattered hamlets," he urged.

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
